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CAPSULE SUMMARY BA-1778 Nelson-Bowen House 1310 Hollins Lane Mount Washington, Baltimore County Circa 1854 Private

The Nelson-Bowen House, circa 1854, is located near Green Spring Junction and the historic village of Mount Washington, in the Ninth District of Baltimore County. This vernacular brick dwelling was constructed for Michael R. Buttner. The property remained in the Buttner family for forty-nine years. After the Buttners sold the property it exchanged hands eight times between 1903 and 2002. Located along Falls Road, an important turnpike during the 19th century, the Nelson-Bowen house is one of the earliest remaining houses in the area of Mount Washington.

Constructed circa 1854, this two-story vernacular dwelling is located along Falls Road at 1310 Hollins Lane. Fronting west towards Falls Road, this two-and-a-half-story dwelling is sited in a suburban setting on a sloping grassy lot adjacent to the Robert E. Lee Park. It is surrounded by mature and immature trees and shrubs, landscaping, and foundation plantings. A gravel driveway leads from Hollins Lane to the dwelling. A wood rail fence and a picket fence line the perimeter of the property. A 1940s garage is associated with the property. Sitting on a solid random rubble stone foundation, this brick dwelling is capped with a side gable roof clad in asphalt shingles. The building is constructed in six-course American-bond, and the roof features overhanging eaves and a wood soffit. Two interior-end brick corbeled chimneys with a course of dentils rise above the roof. A twostory stucco clad addition, dating to the first half of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, is located on the north elevation. One covered chimney rises along the east elevation of the addition and pierces the roof. The onestory wood-frame garage is sited to the east of the house.



Constructed circa 1854, this two-story vernacular dwelling is located along Falls Road at 1310 Hollins Lane. Fronting west towards Falls Road, this two-and-a-half-story dwelling is sited in a suburban setting on a sloping grassy lot adjacent to the Robert E. Lee Park. It is surrounded by mature and immature trees and shrubs, landscaping, and foundation plantings. A gravel driveway leads from Hollins Lane to the dwelling. A wood rail fence and a picket fence line the perimeter of the property. A 1940s garage is associated with this property. Sitting on a solid random rubble stone foundation, this brick dwelling is capped with a side gable roof clad in asphalt shingles. The building is constructed in a six-course American-bond, and the roof features overhanging eaves and a wood soffit. Two interior-end brick corbeled chimneys with a course of dentils rise above the roof. A two-story stucco clad addition, dating to the first half of the 20th century, is located on the north elevation. One covered chimney rises along the east elevation of the addition and pierces the roof.

#### EXTERIOR

The west elevation of the stucco-clad main block is two stories in height and three bays across with asymmetrical fenestration. The first story includes two 6/6 wood-sash windows with wood sills and jack-arch lintels. The off-center entrance contains a single-leaf 6-recessed panel wood door. An aluminum 1-light storm door covers this entry. The recessed entry features a Greek Revival wood door surround with an open pediment, a plain entablature, and pilasters. Illuminating the entrance is a 3-light transom. Leading to the door are four granite stone steps. The second story has three 6/6 wood-sash windows each, with wood sills and jack-arch lintels. Each of the windows are paired with wood louvered shutters. The first story of the addition has two 6/6 wood-sash windows with square wood sills. A single-leaf doorway was sized down to allow for the installation of a bay window with one 1-light vinyl fixed and two 1-light vinyl casement windows. Vinyl siding covers the area below the bay window. The second story of the addition contains two 6-light wood awning windows with thin wood sills. The stucco addition has a water table clad with stucco.

The north elevation of the addition has one 6/6 wood-sash window on the first story. The second story features two 6-light wood casement windows. Each of the widows have thin wood sills.

The east elevation of the main block has one 1-light awning window covered with a metal grate in the basement story. The first story exhibits two 6/6 wood-sash windows. A four-panel wood door is off-center and illuminated with a three-light transom. The second story contains three 6/6 wood-sash windows. Each of the windows in the main block are supported with wood sills and jack-arch lintels. Covering two bays of the addition is a half-hipped roof porch supported with brick posts. The first story of the addition has one single-leaf 6-panel wood door covered with an aluminum jalousie door. Flanking the door is one 6/6 wood-sash window with a thin wood sill. The second story of the addition have two 6-light wood awning windows with thin wood sills.

Two 6/6 wood sash windows on both the first and second stories are located on the south elevation of the main block. Each of the windows are framed with wood sills and jack arch lintels.

#### INTERIOR

The main block of the house features a central-passage plan with a straight-flight stair to the second-story hall. The closed stringer stair features round-nosed treads. The passage has retained the original plaster and painted walls and ceiling, and the original wood floorboards and flush five-inch baseboard. The west door uses a cyma reversa molding and retains the original brass knob. The door casings for the north and south doorways have beaded moldings. The south doorway contains a single-leaf wood 6-light, 2-panel wood door with the original brass knob. The north doorway contains a single-leaf 6-panel wood door with a brass knob. Both the north and south doors have flush panels.

The living room to the south has retained the original random width tongue-and-groove floors, and painted plaster ceiling and walls. The baseboard around the perimeter of the room is original with an added shoe molding. The original window casings are beaded with flush sills, and the original door casings are beaded. The double-ogee crown molding around the perimeter of the room is not original. The doors have retained the original brass knobs and lock boxes. The fireplace on the south wall exhibits a replacement keystone marble mantel with a chamfered mantel shelf. Flanking the projecting keystone on the mantel are two marble inset panels. The mantle appears to date to the late 19th century. The fireplace features a small slate hearth. Built-in bookshelves, not original, are located in the southeast corner of the room.

The rear passage contains original random-width floorboards, and the original painted plaster ceiling and walls. Same as the front passage, the original five baseboard is flush. The original west door casing features an ogee molding. This doorway is illuminated . with a 3-light hopper transom window. The south door leading to the living room is a single-leaf 6-light, 2-panel wood door with a brass knob. The north and south door casings are a simple beaded molding. Access to the basement is available through the doorway underneath the straight stair to the west. The basement doorway contains the original single-leaf 2-panel wood door with a replacement knob and lock box.

The dining room to the north of the passage has similar tongue-and-groove random-width floorboards as the living room. The painted plaster ceiling and walls are also original. Around the perimeter of the room is a flush baseboard with an added shoe molding. The original window casings are beaded with flush sills, and the original door casings are beaded. The doors have retained the original brass knobs and lock boxes. The double-ogee crown molding around the perimeter of the room is not original. With a slight variation in detail, the north fireplace marble mantel is similar to the one in the living room. The keystone is not set directly below the mantle shelf, and the inset panels do not continue the full-length of the surround to the hearth. The mantel appears to date to the late 19th century. The firebox is parged and not currently in use. Not original to the dining room, are built in shelves and cabinets west of the chimney breast.

North of the dining room is the addition containing a living room and a kitchen. The two-and-a-half inch tongue-and-groove floorboards in the living room are replacement. The masonry walls are painted, and the ceiling is painted wallboard with partially exposed ceiling joists. The original six-inch flush baseboard has a shoe molding. The original window casings are beaded with flush wood sills. One doorways has a 6-panel single-leaf wood door with a flush casing. Another doorway holds a single-leaf 6-panel wood door with a replacement knob and a quarter-round molding surround. The third doorway has a beaded door surround with a missing door. Three steps lead up to the fourth flush vertical board door which leads to the second story of the addition. Built-in bookshelves have been added to the west wall.

Much alteration has occurred in the kitchen. It has replacement thin pine floorboards, and replacement vertical-board and brick veneer covering the walls. The ceiling has been redone with textured plaster. The window casings are flush and there is a double-ogee crown molding around the perimeter of the room, which is not original.

The second floor of the main block consists of two bedrooms, a bathroom, and a linen closet. The master bedroom in the main block has the bathroom and a closet. The fireplace is filled in and covered and the surround is flush. The stair rail on the second story features a turned newel post. The fireplace in the second bedroom has been filled in and covered. The details on the second floor are similar to the first floor. The addition has a sloping ceiling and holds a bedroom and a large bathroom. The basement of the main brick section is not finished and exhibit pit sawn joists, parged stone floors and walls. On the east elevation is a jalousie door covered with a double-leaf metal grate door which leads to the exterior.

#### SIGNIFICANCE STATEMENT

The Nelson-Bowen House, circa 1854, is located near Green Spring Junction and the historic village of Mount Washington, in the Ninth District of Baltimore County. This vernacular brick dwelling was constructed for Michael R. Buttner. The property remained in the Buttner family for forty-nine years. After the Buttners sold the property it exchanged hands eight times between 1903 and 2002. Located along Falls Road, an important turnpike during the 19th century, the Nelson-Bowen house is one of the earliest remaining houses in the area of Mount Washington.

#### HISTORY

The Nelson-Bowen House, is significant for its location near Green Spring Junction which is situated on the Northern Central Railway near Lake Roland. With several mineral springs in the area, Green Spring Junction served as a summer resort for many Baltimorians during the mid-19th century. By 1881, the Green Spring Methodist Episcopal church, an African-American congregation, was in the village.(1)

The small village of Mount Washington, located south of Hollins Lane, is also near the Northern Central Railway, five miles north of the Baltimore City line. The population in 1881 was 1061 people. The churches in the area include the Sacred Heart of Jesus, St. John's, a Presbyterian, and one Methodist Episcopal. Copper mining was important to the area during the late 19th century. In 1881, the town was served by a public hall, three public schools, a seminary for young ladies, and Champion Lodge, No. 84, Knights of Pythias.(2)

The Nelson-Bowen House is not noted on the 1850 Sidney Map. The land on which the Nelson-Bowen House is situated originally was part of Samuel Barnes estate in 1850. Samuel Barnes and his large estate is located on the 1850 map adjacent to the Northern Central Railroad.(3) In 1854 and 1857, Samuel Barnes sold two portions of his large estate to Michael R. Buttner. The architectural and primary evidence suggest Buttner had the dwelling built about this time. Michael Buttner and his wife, Anna, resided at here for the next thirty-two years. The 1877 Sidney Atlas outlines the property of 1310 Hollins Lane and denotes Buttner as the occupant.(4) In 1889, Michael and Anna transferred the property to a relative, Henry Otto Buttner, who kept it until 1903. James Starr purchased the property in 1903 and is indicated on the 1915 Atlas.(5) The property remained in the Starr family until 1926. It was exchanged four times between 1926 and 1939, when Eleanor Brooke Cottman bought it. Cottman resided here for thirty-six years and then sold the property to Robert F. Adsit. Adsit owned the property for twenty-seven years when it was then sold to James E. Heffron.

This house at 1310 Hollins Lane, a vernacular 1850s brick dwelling, is a typical representative of brick dwellings located

throughout Baltimore County. Vernacular buildings tend to have little to no stylistic detailing and are typically constructed by local builders with locally available tools and materials. Vernacular architecture accounts for the majority of the built environment and reflects the traditions of society, rather than the whims of the architect.(6) Throughout Baltimore County, there are a number of vernacular brick houses from this period. Commonly, as in the case of the house at 1310 Hollins Lane, these brick dwellings are two stories in height, single-pile with side gable roofs. This continuity of form is a result of folk architecture and the reliance on constructing forms that had been built by the previous generation.


FIRST FLOOR PLAN NOT DRAWN TO SCALE



DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

In searching an area East of Falls Road for buildings which might pre-date the Civil War era a house that should be considered is the brick structure at # 6131 Falls Raod. It is a full two story dwelling resting on a fieldstone foundation that is 18 inches high on the west side. The structure is capped with a gable end roof and extended to the North by a one-andone-half story log addition.

The main block is three bays wide and two deep. It has a center hall and regular fenestration although the entrance or middle bays are off center to the North. The windows are 6/6 sash and trimmed with louvered shutters that have shutter locks from three different periods. The oldest of these is guessed to be the rat tail locks seen on several windows.

A full porch has been removed on the east side. The north bay of this facade contains a bulkhead entrance to the cellar.

Plastering, insulation, etc. conceal much of the construction of the building. Nothing was observed that supports local belief that the house is "over 200 years old." The present owner learned from the Tormey family across the street that that family's presence in this neighborhood and in their house can be documented back to 1857 and they are strong in their belief that the brick house pre-dates their frame dwelling. It probably does but no clearly identifiable 18th century fabric can be seen.

What can be seen, however, is quite interesting. There is no "hall" as such but rather front and back stairs that are enclosed in a central location. The entrance door opens practically right on the first step of the stairs (41 inches wide) and doors on the immediate right and left give access to the The parlors each have a fireplace served by the interior parlors. end chimneys. The fireplaces are of the round arch coal burning type. In both parlors they are faced with elaborate mantels and surrounds carved from slate and are marbleized. They are further decorated with etched spandrels and keys with figurines. The chimney breasts are 56 3/4 inches wide and project into the room 181 inches. The rooms on the first level have 8 foot ceilings. Relatively plain mouldings with three-quarter round inner edges decorate the doors and windows. In these rooms and elsewhere in the house double cross mortise-and-tenon doors were seen that have early metal box locks.

Like the first level the upper level consist mainly of two room and the narrow hall. The same mouldings are present and door types. The ceilings are 8 feet 4 inches on this level and the

chimneys are narrower. That of the south room is 32 inches wide and projects from the wall 17 inches.

There is no known access to the roof framing.

Examination of the basement shows a full sized room with walls made of flat fieldstones and an attempt at coursing.  $3" \times 11\frac{1}{2}"$  joists were seen that were vertically sawn on the broad side and hewn on the edge. The sawmarks were not as regualr as one would expect for mechanically sawn lumber.

#### North wing:

The absence of a south end wall for this section proves it to be an addition. Although no wall logs were seen, the thickness of the walls and the recollection of the owner of having seen "rubble" infill (chinking) while doing spot repair suggest that this is a log building. It is one-and-one-half stories high, approximately 21 feet long (three bays) and 15 feet(two bays) deep.

The west facade of this wing has evenly placed 6/6 windows in the outer bays, although they are off center to the block. Like the main block there is a centrally located entrance with a northern shift due to centrally placed stairs. The north end is symmetrical with two tall evenly placed casement windows in the upper level and one centrally placed 6/6 below. There is no end chimney, only a modern exterior flue attached to the northeast corner. The east facade is like that of the west (although the openings do not line up between the two) and has only recently been altered for a porch.

The interior of the log wing in some ways is as immitative as the exterior. It consists of two rooms down and two up with a central stairs. Its first floor ceilings are 8 feet 2 inches high while upstairs they are the typical tray ceilings and knee walls of a half story.

The owner has collected the tradition told by the Tormeys that this addition housed a shoemakers' shop.


